Zine: a homemade/online publication devoted to specialised and often unconventional subject matter



"OTHERNESS"

The zine opts for a more visual appeal, using graphic text and photograph snippets from magazines; serving as powerful tools to convey raw emotions that stem from a group of marginalized individuals. The piece aims to **bridge** the gap between the audience and the observed group, in an attempt to draw audience into direct contact with the intimate realities faced by these women on a daily basis.

WHAT'S MISSING?


- Invisible/hidden disabilities representation
