Maracle illuminates the dire consequences of land theft through the depiction of Indigenous families forced into squatting on mud flats or houseboats as a result of displacement from their ancestral lands.



The Land Back movement within Maracle's work underscores the collective resistance against land dispossession, reflecting Indigenous peoples' enduring quest for sovereignty, liberation, and the restoration of stolen ancestral lands.

DISPLACEMENT OF INDIGENOUS CULTURE & KNOWLEDGES
